
2024 NORTH CAROLINA SCHOOL MEALS CALDWELL COUNTY SCHOOLS

Students cannot learn if they are hungry. School meals are a powerful tool for increasing academic achievement and fighting child hunger. This profile provides a snapshot of how **Caldwell County Schools** is providing access to healthy school meals for students in **Caldwell County**. Use this profile to celebrate successes and identify opportunities to continue the fight against child hunger.

Overview of the Program

- The **National School Lunch Program** and **School Breakfast Program** provide healthy meals that meet federal nutrition guidelines to students.
- School meals have many benefits including improved academic performance and attendance, fewer behavioral issues, improved food security, and better diet quality.¹
- All students can participate in school meals. **Students from low-income households** can qualify for free or reduced-price (FRP) school meals.
- Districts that have a high percentage of low-income students may opt to serve meals through the **Community Eligibility Provision** (CEP). CEP provides school meals at no cost to families in high poverty areas without having to fill out school meals applications.

School Meals Policy Updates

- The North Carolina General Assembly allocated recurring funds in the 2023 Appropriations Act (House Bill 259) to **provide lunch at no cost to students eligible for reduced-price lunch.**
- During the 2023-24 school year, North Carolina began participating in the **Direct** Certification with Medicaid (DC-M) demonstration project. The DC-M project allows children receiving Medicaid from households who meet income eligibility guidelines to be directly certified to receive free or reduced-price school meals without having to fill out a household application.
